The Arthroscopy Teaching Centre at the QEII Health Sciences Centre has been in existence since 1985, and continues to grow and improve.

With the combined support of our university, Dalhousie, as well as the corporate support from partners who include Smith & Nephew Dyonics, Linvatec, Inc., and Arthrex, we have developed a permanent teaching center within our tertiary care hospital, the QEII Health Sciences Centre.

We have been able to develop a fellowship program for orthopaedic graduates from around the globe. Fellows have attended from such varied countries as England, Australia and Ecuador.

The fellowship is a one-year experience with combined exposure to clinical sports medicine and arthroscopy, coupled with a research component.

Fellows will be involved in the activities of the Orthopaedic and Sport Medicine Clinic, which is a university-associated multi-disciplinary clinic. Fellows will also gain excellent clinical experience at the QEII Health Sciences Centre, which is the tertiary care teaching hospital of Dalhousie University.

Fellows will be responsible for participating in active research, which will be tailored to the experience of each candidate. One day per week will be protected for these research activities.

It is expected that fellows will participate in weekly conferences, including basic science lectures, grand rounds, journal club, and sports medicine rounds.

The fellowship will be constructed to meet the needs and expectations of each individual.

Our faculty has held annual wet lab arthroscopic surgery meetings in the facilities at our medical school, and also traveled internationally to such developing countries as Cuba to assist in their development.

Within the residency program in orthopaedic surgery at Dalhousie University, we have an ongoing compliment of eighteen residents in orthopaedic training, as well as enumerable elective students and research cohorts.
